


## Speech and Language of the 4-Year-Old

who?



At age 4 years, your child . . .





follows commands even though objects are not present

can speak of imaginary conditions such as "suppose that . . . " or "I hope . . . "

asks many questions but is more interested in how answers fit his or her own thoughts than in the explanation

uses sentences of 4 to 5 words asks "who" and "why" questions begins to combine sentences with and uses past tense correctly copies a line and a circle uses the following sounds correctly:

m, n, ng, p, f, h, w, y (as in yes), k, b, d, g, t

stays with one activity for 11 to 12 minutes







RING

u can stimulate your 4-year-old child's speech and language if you . .

help your child classify objects and things, such as talking about what kinds of things you can ride in

teach your child correct use of a telephone

ask your child to help you plan activities such as what to prepare for Christmas dinner


use words indicating space and position as you play (for example, "Go under and over the coffee table, walk in front of and behind the chair, go in and out of the tunnel")

give your child more responsibility talk with your child as you would any person read longer stories to your child

let your child make up stories for you as you type them into the computer; let your child edit, if desired, and then illustrate the story

continue to show your pleasure at your child's development in speech, language, and thought

try not to expect absolute perfection in the way your child pronounces words





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
